#### CALL to WORSHIP

One: "All these things my hand has made," says the Lord,
All: Yet we are your beloved, whom you look upon.

One: To our God we give thanks and praise,

All: Let us worship God together.

#### PRAYER of CONFESSION

Wondrous God who sets suns and moons above us, mountains and valleys beneath us, friends and strangers among us, we confess that we have been unfaithful to our covenant with you and with one another. We have worshipped other gods: money, power, greed, and convenience. We have served our own self-interest instead of serving only you and your people. We have not loved our neighbor as you have commanded, nor have we rightly loved ourselves. God of everlasting love, forgive us. With your unending grace bring us back into the fullness of our covenant with you and with one another. Through Jesus Christ our Lord.

#### PROMISE of FORGIVENESS

One: Hear the good news: The Lord is faithful in all God's words and deeds. The Lord upholds all who are falling and raises up all who are bowed down. In the name of Jesus Christ, you are forgiven!

All: Thanks be to God! Alleluia! Amen!

#### SCRIPTURE READING — Isaiah 66:1-2, 18-23

<sup>1</sup>Thus says the Lord: Heaven is my throne and the earth is my footstool; what is the house that you would build for me, and what is my resting place? <sup>2</sup>All these things my hand has made, and so all these things are mine, says the Lord. But this is the one to whom I will look, to the humble and contrite in spirit, who trembles at my word.

<sup>18</sup> For I know their works and their thoughts, and I am coming to gather all nations and tongues; and they shall come and shall see my glory, <sup>19</sup> and I will set a sign among them. From them I will send survivors to the nations, to Tarshish, Put, and Lud—which draw the bow—to Tubal and Javan, to the coastlands far away that have not heard of my fame or seen my glory; and they shall declare my glory among the nations. <sup>20</sup> They shall bring all your kindred from all the nations as an offering to the Lord, on horses, and in chariots, and in litters, and on mules, and on dromedaries, to my holy mountain Jerusalem, says the Lord, just as the Israelites bring a grain offering in a clean vessel to the house of the Lord. <sup>21</sup> And I will also take some of them as priests and as Levites, says the Lord. <sup>22</sup> For as the new heavens and the new earth, which I will make, shall remain before me,

says the Lord; so shall your descendants and your name remain. <sup>23</sup> From new moon to new moon, and from sabbath to sabbath, all flesh shall come to worship before me, says the Lord.

One: This is the Word of the Lord.

All: Thanks be to God.

#### AFFIRMATION of FAITH - from A Brief Statement of Faith
