FAITH FORMATION UPDATE FROM PASTOR ALEX

Dear Priesthood of All Believers,

We will be continuing our different, yet strong start to the faith formation year as October comes into focus. For instance, Adult Education we will be having a special guest teach during our Sunday School hour! I hope you will join us welcome Dr. Mark Achtemeier as he will be teaching a four-week class on “The Best Supporting Characters of the New Testament.” In addition to being to being Pastor Rachel’s father, Dr. Achtemeier has been a minister, author, and a professor of theology and ethics at University of Dubuque Theological Seminary.

Here is Dr. Achtemeier’s description of the class for October: “Gentiles, Tax Collectors, Levites, Samaritans, Pharisees, Money Changers, and more...The narratives of the New Testament are filled with a wide variety of supporting characters whose names we may have heard before, but whose deeper identities and interests remain a bit murky. In this four-week study, led by Dr. Mark Achtemeier, we will investigate how a more detailed understanding of these supporting characters in the New Testament can radically affect our understanding of familiar passages and their implications for faith and life today.” We are very excited to have him teach and hope you will join us over Zoom from 9:00 to 10:00 a.m. during the month of October. STEWARDSHIP CAMPAIGN 2020

Our Stewardship Campaign this year is going to be very different than all those in the past (except, possibly, for the ones in the 1918 – 1919 time-frame but there are no records of them). Almost all of our communication to you will be written or by video. The campaign, as all in the past, seeks you to be stewards in the life of our church, community, and world.

What Does a Steward of God Do?

Our scriptural understanding of stewardship and our roles as stewards comes from 1 Corinthians 4:1 - “Think of us in this way, as servants of Christ and stewards of God’s mysteries,” and 1 Peter 4:10 - “Like good stewards of the manifold grace of God, serve one another with whatever gift each of you has received.”

How Are We To Be Servants Of Christ And Stewards Of God’s Mysteries In This Time Of Distress And Uncertainty?

Love one another and your neighbor. Participate regularly in church worship, either in person as the pandemic allows, or watch on-line through the Internet, to glorify God's name and works. Enjoy the love of the congregation through phone calls and emails, and on-line Adult Education at 9:00 am on Sundays, fellowship at 11:30 am on Sundays, and the noon Bible Study on Wednesdays.

By the Grace of God, we are benefactors of God's mysteries: life, the sun and a planet that sustain us, and the Word of God through prophets and Jesus Christ. We are stewards of the earth and the Word of God which requires us to take care of our environment, plants, animals, families, communities, and churches.

How Do We Serve One Another With Whatever Gift Each Of Us Has Received?

God measures our gifts with a measure different from that of the world; it's by the giver's capacity, and the giver's attitude. Scripture speaks to this question directly: from 2 Corinthians 9:7-9 - “Each of you must give as you have made up your mind, not reluctantly or under compulsion, for God loves a cheerful giver. And God is able to provide you with every blessing in abundance, so that by always having enough of everything, you may share abundantly in every good work.”

Offer what you have and what you can do. Be a generous giver of your resources, time, and talents. Complete an Estimate of Giving for 2021, which will soon be sent to you. Volunteer your time and talents at one of our many community missions: the Food Center, the Ivins Outreach Center, and the Clothing Center, or as a teacher of Christian Education.

Our church has been blessed with competent and faithful leadership in keeping the congregation focused on its mission to proclaim the gospel of grace. We are a church; we have been sustained; and with God, we are going to continue.

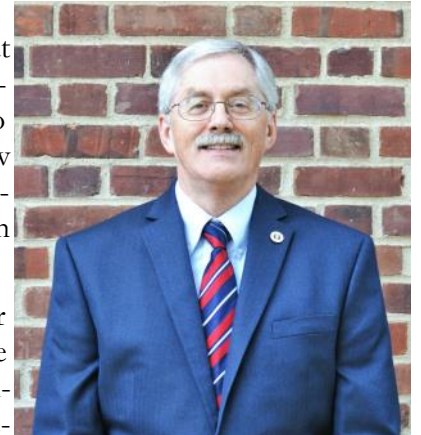
GOING TO CHURCH: IT CAN BE GOOD FOR YOU

One of the most striking scientific discoveries about religion in recent years is that going to church weekly is good for you. Regular worship attendance – at least, participating in acts of devotion to God (such as online worship) – has been found to boost the immune system and decrease blood pressure. This news may not be new to some. We have often heard, “Confession is good for the soul.” Well, it is evidently good for the body, too. Engaging in earnest acts of piety may add as much as two or three years to your life. The reason for this, however, is not clear.

It is known that, on average, regular church-goers drink less, smoke less, use fewer recreational drugs, and are less sexually promiscuous than non-church goers. These behaviors provide obvious benefits for increasing longevity. They should be maintained, not just as matter of health, but of faithfulness, also. Having a healthy lifestyle is a discipline of stewardship in that we show respect and care for our bodies as created by God.

“Just being religious” is not guarantee that all illnesses – particularly COVID-19 – and ailments will be avoided or cured. You need to take an active part to keep fit, and that includes getting regular check-ups and paying attention to trustworthy medical and mental healthcare professionals. But having a relationship with God who is close and loving, who hears your prayers and knows your frustrations, is an important factor to having a wholesome life.

Join us this fall as we complete our journey through 2nd Samuel. Each week we will explore the biblical text together and do so with the assistance of a theological commentary alongside it. MPC LIVESTREAMING

Worship services are now able to be streamed over the internet as they happen at MPC giving those unable to attend the opportunity to be a part of worship from their home or wherever they wish to view Sunday worship.

To view the livestream, simply click on the "Virtual Worship" button on the homepage of MPC's website at www.mpcusa.org. The livestream window will appear at the top of the linked page.

You are now able to watch the livestream of the Sunday worship on YouTube as well. This will give you the capability of watching the services full-screen. Visit www.youtube.com and enter Morrisville Presbyterian Church in the search bar and click on the MPC channel signified by the MPC logo. Under the "Home" tab of the channel should be a number of small video screens (thumbnails). Starting at approximately 10:20 a.m., one of them will contain "Live" in the upper right corner. Simply click on that thumbnail to watch the livestream. In the video window there are icons to lower and increase the audio and make the video full-screen. You make also press "f" to activate the full-screen option.



OUTSIDE COMMUNION SERVICE



On Sunday, September 20, a celebration of the Sacrament of the Lord's Supper was held outside at MPC. This was the first in-person communion held since March and was welcomed by many members of the congregation. Those in attendance were able to sing and receive communion, all while maintaining social distancing. Another celebration is being planned and the date and time will be announced in the near future.

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
