PRELUDE — The Kingdom of God is Justice and Peace - Taizé Chant

CALL to WORSHIP

One: Where is God when fear seeks to unravel individuals and communities?

All: God is leading us in the darkness, against all the odds of the world.

One: Is anything impossible with God?

All: Nothing is impossible with God. God can transform the hearts of persecutors and bullies and set their feet on the path of compassion. God can bring light into the deepest darkness.

One: For what can we hope and pray?

All: That scales fall from every eye and the compassion of Christ fills every heart.

One: What does the Lord require of us?

All: That we will do justice, love kindness, and walk humbly with our God. May we see each other with the eyes of God and love one another with the heart of God. Let us worship God together.

PRAYER of CONFESSION

God of endless Grace, you laid your hands on Ananias that he might lay his hands on Saul. You asked Ananias to love the unlovely intimately. You asked Saul to retreat from his old worldview and take on yours. And you ask these same things of us. But our greed and our lust for power create enemies where we should find friends. We fail to offer comfort and aid to those who are afraid and beat down by the burdens of life. We are as blind and willful as Saul to the pain and the destruction of our wrongdoings and our well-meaning crusades. How many times do we write someone off as hopeless or useless or too dangerous? How often do we believe that your mandate 'to love others as we love ourselves' is meant for someone else? Forgive us, merciful One. Give us sight to see with your eyes, and hearts to love with your love. Cleanse our minds of judgment and our hearts of stinginess. Prepare us to see others as Jesus did and to love others as Christ loves us.

OLD TESTAMENT READING — Micah 6:6-8

⁶ 'With what shall I come before the Lord, and bow myself before God on high? Shall I come before him with burnt-offerings, with calves a year old? ⁷ Will the Lord be pleased with thousands of rams, with tens of thousands of rivers of oil? Shall I give my firstborn for my transgression, the fruit of my body for the sin of my soul?' ⁸ He has told you, O mortal, what is good; and what does the Lord require of you but to do justice, and to love kindness, and to walk humbly with your God?

One: This is the Word of the Lord.

All: Thanks be to God.

SCRIPTURE READING — Acts 9:1-19

Meanwhile Saul, still breathing threats and murder against the disciples of the Lord, went to the high priest and asked him for letters to the synagogues at Damascus, so that if he found any who belonged to the Way, men or women, he might bring them bound to Jerusalem. Now as he was going along and approaching Damascus, suddenly a light from heaven flashed around him. He fell to the ground and heard a voice saying to him, 'Saul, Saul, why do you persecute me?' He asked, 'Who are you, Lord?' The reply came, 'I am Jesus, whom you are persecuting. But get up and enter the city, and you will be told what you are to do.' The men who were travelling with him stood speechless because they heard the voice but saw no one. Saul got up from the ground, and though his eyes were open, he could see nothing; so they led him by the hand and brought him into Damascus. For three days he was without sight, and neither ate nor drank.

Now there was a disciple in Damascus named Ananias. The Lord said to him in a vision, 'Ananias.' He answered, 'Here I am, Lord.' The Lord said to him, 'Get up and go to the street called Straight, and at the house of Judas look for a man of Tarsus named Saul. At this moment he is praying, and he has seen in a vision a man named Ananias come in and lay his hands on him so that he might regain his sight.' But Ananias answered, 'Lord, I have heard from many about this man, how much evil he has done to your saints in Jerusalem; and here he has authority from the chief priests to bind all who invoke your name.' But the Lord said to him, 'Go, for he is an instrument whom I have chosen to bring my name before Gentiles and kings and before the people of Israel; I myself will show him how much he must suffer for the sake of my name.' So Ananias went and entered the house. He laid his hands on Saul and said, 'Brother Saul, the Lord Jesus, who appeared to you on your way here, has sent me so that you may regain your sight and be filled with the Holy Spirit.' And immediately something like scales fell from his eyes, and his sight was restored. Then he got up and was baptized, and after taking some food, he regained his strength.
